

## Information sheet: SSS No. 23 “Remembering Bob Hawke”

### Last Minute Change of Venue

We recently learnt that Northbridge Oval could not be used for this year’s SSS Event, as the amenities block is undergoing extensive renovations. The assembly area has moved 300m NE to War Memorial Park. (Eventor now shows the correct new location.)

### New Toilet Arrangements

You will need a smart phone with the NSW Services App to go to the toilet!!!

Northbridge Golf Club have generously given us permission to use the toilets inside their clubhouse.

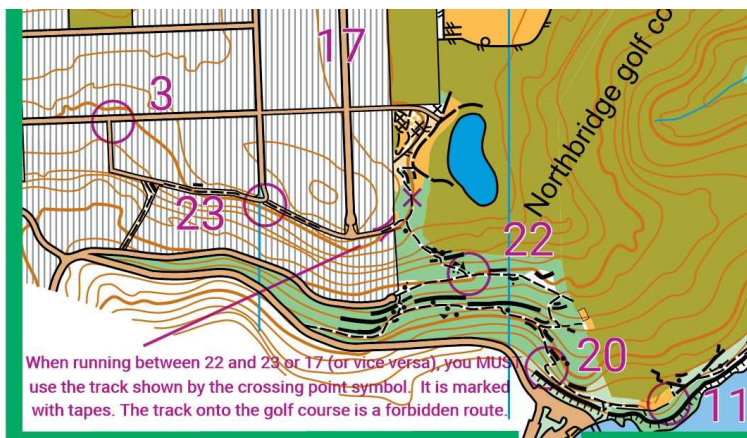
The clubhouse is about 100m from our assembly area (through the golf club carpark). At the main entrance, scan the NSW Govt QR code displayed outside the front door to check-in to the premises. After entering turn right, then turn left. (Do not go downstairs.) After 5m turn right again, at a sign to “Restrooms”. The “Gents” is at the end of the hallway, and the “Ladies” around yet another corner! (It’s easier than it sounds... guys go “right, left, right” and girls go “right, left, right, right”.)

Please be courteous to the other users of the amenities, as we are their guests. Don’t forget to “check-out” when you leave!

### The Northbridge Golf Course is OUT OF BOUNDS

Like all golf courses, 99.9% Northbridge Golf Course is OUT OF BOUNDS.

There are bush tracks along the southwest, south and east edges of the golf course which are used by bush-walkers and the SSS course, but you may not enter land that is obviously golf course land, not bushland.



Near control 11 (see map) you are permitted to cross the edge of the golf course. There are 2 signs stating this: one near control 11 and the other on the west side of the small open area (mapped in yellow).

As noted on the map, when running between 22 and 23 or 17 (or vice versa), you MUST use the track shown within the crossing point symbol (X). It is marked with tapes. The track to the golf course is a forbidden route (X). (If you reach golf course land, then you MUST go back.)

### Remembering Bob Hawke

Bob Hawke, Labor’s longest serving prime minister is one of the most illustrious residents of Northbridge. In 1991, Hawke and his then-wife Hazel paid \$1.23 million for a three-bedroom “knockdown” overlooking Sugarloaf Bay. A new house was built on the land, and Bob lived there with his second wife Blanche until they sold it in 2019. It is said that the sale price was over \$9 million. You can see his house while competing, as it is directly opposite control number 19. (There is a plaque very close to the control.) Sadly, the house is currently undergoing extensive renovations and is not looking its best.
